Chung Wah Chinese School Trip to San Francisco

On December 5, 2025, the students and families of Chung Wah Chinese School embarked on a fun-filled and educational field trip to San Francisco, immersing themselves in the rich history and culture of Chinatown.

The day began with a guided walking tour led by **Bill Louie** of the *Chinese Historical Society of America (CHSA)*. As the group made their way through Chinatown, students learned about the struggles, resilience, and achievements of Chinese Americans whose stories are woven into the streets and buildings of the neighborhood.

The first stop was the famous *Golden Gate Fortune Cookie Factory*. Students and their families enjoyed watching how fortune cookies are made by hand. The experience gave everyone a sweet start to the day.

Next, the group visited *Leung's White Crane Dragon and Lion Dance Association*, established in 1971, they are one of the oldest active lion dance groups in North America. They are known for consistently placing in national and international lion dance competitions. With permission from **Daniel Leung**, board member **Mike Mak** gave a tour of the studio and shared the history of the organization and the importance of lion and dragon dance traditions while preserving Chinese culture.

The third stop was the historic *Ma-Tsu Temple*, a small Taoist temple tucked along Beckett Street. Although the children were not permitted to enter, they were able to quietly observe a ceremony taking place inside, offering a meaningful glimpse into spiritual practices that continue to thrive in Chinatown.

The fourth stop highlighted an important part of Chinatown's social history: its *SRO (single room occupancy)* buildings. These modest rooms, often just 15 by 15 feet, functioned like dormitories with shared kitchens and bathrooms. Entire families frequently lived in these small spaces, a testament to the sacrifices and perseverance of early immigrant communities.

Lunch was enjoyed at *Osmanthus Dim Sum Lounge*, where students and families shared a delicious meal that included garlic noodles, egg rolls, fried tofu, fried chicken wings, garlic green beans, sweet and sour chicken, har gow, and siu mai. After lunch, Bill Louie spoke about the founding of Chinatown and emphasized that it was built by immigrants and continues to be sustained largely by immigrant families today.

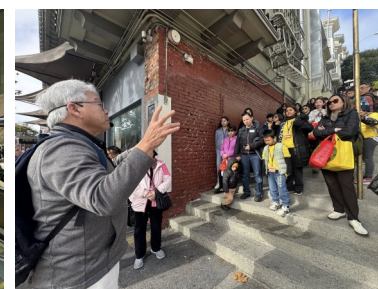
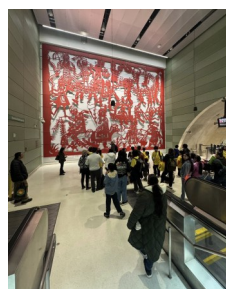
The sixth stop brought the group to the *Rose Pak Station*. There, Bill Louie taught the students about **Rose Pak**, a powerful and influential advocate who played a tremendous role in supporting and revitalizing Chinatown.

The seventh stop was the *Chinese Historical Society of America Museum*, where the group toured a special exhibit honoring **Bruce Lee**. **Jeff Chinn** provided a guided tour, explaining what Bruce Lee represented, not only as a martial artist and actor, but as a symbol of pride, strength, and breaking barriers for Asian Americans. A highlight for the students was participating in an interactive activity where they wrote down something they did not like on a board and then symbolically chopped it in half, just as Bruce Lee might have done.

The final stop was the *Chinese Railroad Workers Museum*. Here, students learned about the vital contributions of Chinese laborers in building the Transcontinental Railroad. Before its completion, cross-country travel and the transportation of goods were extremely difficult and time-consuming. Without the hard work and sacrifice of Chinese railroad workers, it would have taken many more years to connect the nation.

This memorable field trip would not have been possible without the support and leadership of board members, **Kimberly Mar Ku**, **Mike Mak**, **Terry Chen**, **Principal Jing Zhu** and as well as teacher **Cindy Ma, Le**, and **Stephanie Yee**. Their dedication ensured that the students experienced a meaningful day filled with cultural pride, and lasting memories.

Chinese Cemetery Update

Following the rains in January and February, weeds have been growing rapidly at the cemetery's West Parcel, faster than we can keep up with. Special thanks to **Wesley Chow** for his ongoing efforts to keep the growth under control. **Wayne Chan** has also been working diligently at maintaining the grounds, trimming rose bushes, Bird of Paradise and various trees and plants. **Vanetta Wihlidal** has been caring for the Heavenly Garden, weeding, trimming, replanting geraniums, and adding new perennials and lavender plants.

As families prepared for Qing Ming, many visited the cemetery to honor their ancestors by cleaning headstones, burning incense, making food offerings, and gathering in remembrance. Although the official Qing Ming Festival falls on April 5th, CBA held its observance on March 29, 2026.

For generations, the Chinese Cemetery has served as a sacred place of rest, reflection and honor for our loved ones. It is a testament to our history and a bridge between those who came before us and the families we nurture today.

Today, however, the cemetery faces a significant challenge. The existing cemetery grounds are at full capacity, and available burial space is limited. Without expansion, future generations may no longer have the opportunity to be laid to rest alongside their families without these historic grounds.

To ensure that our current and future generations have a place to honor their ancestors, we began a vital expansion project. This project will create additional burial plots which will provide the necessary space to continue our traditions of remembrance for decades to come. This project will require careful planning, permitting, site preparation, infrastructure improvements, landscaping, and long-term maintenance.

This effort is about more than creating additional space. It is about preserving a legacy. It is about ensuring that families can continue to honor their loved ones in a place that has served the Chinese community of Stockton and San Joaquin County for well over a century.

As we reflect on the sacrifices and contributions of those who came before us, we are reminded on the importance of preserving this sacred place for future generations. The cemetery expansion project represents an important step toward ensuring that the traditions, history, and heritage of our community continue for many years to come.

Our ancestors worked hard to build a foundation for us here in Stockton and San Joaquin County. Now, it is our turn to ensure that the foundation remains strong for our children and grandchildren, and future generations.

Chung Wah Lion Dance Team Bless Local Businesses!

On February 28, 2026, board member **Mike Mak** lead the newly formed *Chung Wah Lion Dance* team to bless local businesses.

In a historic moment for the *Stockton Chinese Benevolent Association*, a newly formed youth Lion Dance team performed throughout Stockton and Lodi, marking the first active Chinese Lion Dance group affiliated with the organization in its 102-year history. The performance also represents the first active Lion Dance group in the Stockton area in more than 30–40 years, with a strong focus on youth participation.

Over the course of the day, the team performed at eight businesses and organizations across Stockton and Lodi, sharing the tradition and excitement of Lion Dance with the community. The young performers have spent the past three months practicing and preparing for their debut performances, demonstrating dedication and cultural pride. Their efforts reflect the traditional saying in lion dancing: *"Ten minutes of practice gives you one minute on the stage."*

The Lion Dance team is part of a renewed effort to preserve and promote Chinese cultural traditions for the next generation in San Joaquin County. With continued training and community support, the program aims to grow and develop into a strong cultural presence in the region.

The group extends its sincere appreciation to the many businesses and organizations that welcomed the team and generously supported the program:

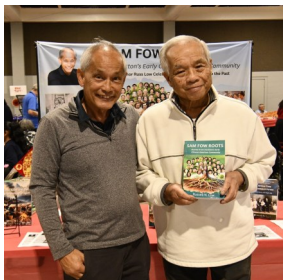

The *Jene Wah Senior Musical Group* delighted the audience with their musical selections, while **Master Joel Juanitas** and his group, *Bahala Na Filipino Martial Arts*, presented an exciting martial arts demonstration. The powerful rhythms of *Stockton Bukkyo Taiko* captivated attendees, and the *CBA Dragon Dance* led by **Runping Lin** and **Dr. Yanhong Wu**, added to the lively atmosphere.

Following a brief intermission, the audience was treated to an impressive performances by award-winning film composer, actor, dancer and martial artist, **Neil Nayyar**, known for his extraordinary ability to play over 130 musical instruments and has auditioned for *America’s Got Talent* and *Steve Harvey*. He’s made appearances on *Good Morning America*, the *Jennifer Hudson Show*, *Fox LA*, the “*Got Milk*” campaign and the popular show, “*Let’s Make a Deal*”.
